Hi Friends,

I'm in Pittsburgh this week babysitting my three adorable (some of the time) grandchildren. As I start my quilting project, they are not only fascinated by the interaction of fabrics and colors, but also the entire process. A bit of advice . . . do not let them cut out the templates and be really, really careful to pick up all the wayward pins. I learned the hard way. Jackson (9) cut out my templates. He's an awesome cutter, but I forgot to measure them when he was finished. As I sewed the pieces together, I realized, too late, that my 3" square was really 3 1/4" by 3". They learned the valuable unsewing lesson. Lily (3) brought me a pin she found on the floor. I now carefully count pins to make sure I have the entire batch before packing up my quilting. Madeline (6), a budding artist, has a great sense of color and we made a beautiful but slightly lopsided star block. All this has reminded me of why quilting has continued to hold my interest. I love the basics and I continue to be challenged as I have been challenged for the past 30 years.

Ten years ago I lived in Pittsburgh and this visit I had a chance to meet with my old Wednesday Night Group. The more things change, the more they stay the same. I cherish these relationships which started in the common interest of quilting and blossomed into 20+ years of friendship. My hope for you is the experiences in QC will continue and blossom into lasting friendships also.

Quilt Show News from Lucy Loveridge, Show Chair

After a slow start, my February was brightened by a whole slew of entries to the Annual Quilt Show. By the February meeting, the total received was 61 quilts from 42 members; the final count today is 196 quilts from 135 members! It's heartening to have such a high level of participation in the quilt show and to have a good number of those prolific quilters who have more than one quilt to enter. I think, unless everyone entered a king-size or larger quilt, we should be able to accommodate them all but we won't confirm that until we've looked closely at the sizes of the entered quilts, and gone over the available hanging space at the ACA again. From a quick perusal of the pictures included, I'd say we're going to have a beautiful show and that a lot of you better get quilting!

We are still accepting volunteer forms for the show from anyone not exhibiting a quilt. We should have the completed volunteer schedule available for distribution by the April meeting. If life has thrown a wrench into anyone's plans in the meantime, we would still have a month to modify the volunteer schedule and work any conflicts out.

Boutique forms are on the website and will also be available at the April meeting. If you are interested in vending, take a look at it to see what kind of documentation is needed, and start building up your inventory. With three show days instead of two, we'll need more stock to keep the boutique filled until the end of the show.

Remember to help us out with the advertising revenue for the show booklet by suggesting names to Laurel Grady or directing anyone you know with a business or service towards the ad form on the Quilters' Connection webpage. We should be able to accept ads until the March meeting.

QC Workshop Extraordinaire!

The newsletter blurb read:

Saturday, February 18th: "Dating Quilts" with Vivien Sayre An in depth look at the styles, colors, designs from 1800 on; trunk show. Participants bring quilts, fabrics, blocks to discuss and date.

This did not begin to describe the wonders that awaited you in this workshop. I was surprised when walking into the workshop room to see the many tables piled high with quilts. These quilts were revealed one by one as Vivien worked through the early 1800's up to the last quarter of the 20th century. I got to see, feel and study the largest group of 19th and 20th century quilts ever collected in one room outside a museum. (That is my impression, not a scientific fact!) Each quilt had a story to tell. Unfortunately none were labeled but learning to look for the oldest and youngest fabric in a quilt and to identify the style of fabric making in each period and being able to come close to the date a quilt was made when dating the quilts, told quite a story.

There were 100,000's of thousands of dollars of quilts in that room. The group was in awe, making little gasping sounds throughout the day. The beauty or perhaps uniqueness of each quilt was considerable. Vivien has been collecting old quilts for years to use as teaching tools, plus all the old quilts the QC members have collected and brought in to share made for an extensive historical quilt-a-thon. Although a new quilt was unfolded every five to ten minutes, we did not see them all. We had to stop from exhaustion—Vivien was willing to continue! Everyone left feeling moved by the creative and artistic work of all the women of the past two centuries who had worked to produce this group of quilts.

This workshop was a unique experience. Vivien is typical of QC members and quilt teachers—she is smart, fun, funny and generous. She knows her fabrics and quilts and she is a terrific teacher. It was a glorious day filled with our favorite things—quilts.

Library News—February 2006

Come early to use the library

Please remember that you won't be able to use the library unless you come to the meetings early. We plan to arrive at 6pm to set up. We must pack up the library table at 7:15 so we don't miss the meeting ourselves when it starts at 7:30. So please return your books and sign out new ones before taking a seat in the theater.

Why you should borrow lots of books

Since we moved to the Arsenal Center in Watertown, it's become even more important that members borrow as many books from our library as possible. The books are stored in just 4 milk crates in our locked cabinet on the 3rd floor. At 6pm, we load them onto a small luggage cart and bring them down the elevator to the tables on the 1st floor. If you don't take them home each month, they don't fit in the milk crates and fall off the luggage cart when we move it. So, if you don't borrow enough books, we'll have to remove many from our collection.

Reserving books

In Arlington, we used to leave the library open during the whole meeting and Martha announced the names of members for whom we had reserved books. In Watertown that is no longer possible. If you want us to reserve a book for you, you must remember to come get it before 7:15 or it will be given to whoever else asks for it that month.

QC Programs 2005–2006

Saturday, March 18th—Workshop with Liz Axford—Intro to Immersion Dyeing

While learning the basic chemistry of Procion MX dyeing on cotton, we will focus on the two primary methods of systematically manipulating color: developing value gradations (light to dark); and blends from one color to another. Each student will leave with samples and formulas for approximately 25-50 different colors, and enough knowledge to begin further exploration.

Monday, March 20th—Lecture with Liz Axford—“Finding My Way”

In this presentation I trace the development of my quilting from my first clumsy attempts in 1971, to my first completed quilt (1986), to the present. While I was initially attracted to quilting for its formal properties, its potential for personal expression has kept me involved in the medium. Along the way, I have added a variety of techniques: improvisational piecing, hand-dyeing, shibori, felting, to my repertoire.

Saturday, April 15th—Workshop with Dominie Nash—New Life for Old Quilts

Designing a Makeover for your Mistake

Participants will work on paper as we go through the steps of various reconstruction techniques, starting with photocopies of their quilts. I will bring examples of these processes. We will be cutting, pasting, drawing, etc, and you may find several ways of turning your ugly ducklings into swans.

Monday, April 17th—Lecture Dominie Nash—“Deconstruction/Reconstruction: New Life for Old Quilts”

My journey from treasuring every quilt I made, no matter how awful, to finding the courage to give the worst ones a second chance by taking extreme measures, such as chopping them up or reworking the surface, has been an interesting and freeing one. You will see before-and-after shots of these mistakes, and I'll take you through the process which has given them a fresh start in life.

Monday, May 15th—Lecture Jette Clover—“Keeping Track of Time.”

Ever since 1839 photography has become our leading visual experience. We are increasingly relying on photographic images to remember the past. Ultimately having an experience becomes identical with taking a photograph of it. Many people, however, have discovered quilting as an excellent vehicle to express their view about the world they live in. But what happens, when your world changes? Moving from Europe to America made me question how much the environment influences your art work. Were my quilts European (and what does a European quilt look like?), and would they soon become Americanized (and what does an American quilt look like?)? Moving back to Europe this year I have to wonder, if my quilts in the meantime had taken on an American look—and if so, would they now revert back to looking European again?

Quilt Donation Project Update

Remember the fabric I was collecting for the high school student's quilt donation project? Jessica Shin called today with an impressive update: about 40 crib quilt tops completed, with 10 to go. All quilts will be donated to a Boston charity that distributes them to single mothers. Jessica has very much appreciated all the donated fabric. Now she is looking for some help from adults as well as her friends. Here are various ways you could help:

- On Sat., March 18 there will be a group workday in Lexington. Call Jessica at 781.861.3532, or email her at s_ica@hotmail.com (please put Quilting Project in the subject line), if you can help. Then contact her again, closer to the time, when she'll have the location figured out.
- If you cannot work that day but would like to do some in your own home at your convenience, you could pick up one or more completed crib quilt tops and border fabric from Jessica. The task would be cutting out borders and sewing them on by machine.
- More ambitious? You could pick up one or more “care packages” from Jessica, each containing completed crib quilt top, border fabric, batting, and backing fabric. You'd need to cut out and sew on borders, cut backing, put the layers together, pin/baste, and machine quilt.
- Any work you take home needs to be completed and returned to Jessica by March 25. Binding will be done later, in April. I hope to help with that.

Quilters' Connection 2006 Quilt Show and Sale Information and Instructions for Registration

Quilters' Connection's 28th Annual Quilt Show and Sale will be held at the Arsenal Center for the Arts in Watertown on Friday, June 2, Saturday, June 3, and Sunday, June 4, 2006. The Members' Reception will be held on the evening of June 2. Please read the following information and instructions carefully.

Display Requirements—All entries must have a permanent label sewn to the back of the quilt or inside the garment. Include at least your name, town and date. Members working check-in will not be allowed to accept quilts or garments without labels as we cannot be responsible for improperly labeled items.

All quilts must have a sleeve at least 4" wide sewn securely to the back for hanging. If the quilt is more than 50" wide, divide the sleeve in the center (leave a gap in the center of the sleeve) so an extra support wire can be used to hang the quilt. For unusual shapes, or exceptionally large pieces, please consult the Show Chair or a veteran QC member for advice.

Quilt exhibitors must provide the crosspiece from which their quilt will hang. Typically, this is a wooden board the exact width of your quilt, which fits in your sleeve, and is of sufficient strength to support the quilt without twisting, sagging, or breaking. Lattice strips (1/4" x 1 1/2") can be sufficient for small quilts, but a length of 1"x2" or similar lumber is necessary to support a larger, heavier quilt. Test your board with your quilt on it. If it is too wobbly or if it sags or twists, get a stronger board! Drill holes at the upper corners and at any open places in the sleeve to accept the hanging wire. A 1/8" drill bit will provide a large enough sized hole.

Quilt exhibitors whose quilts have been accepted for the show must make their own arrangements to have the quilt delivered to the ACA on Thursday, June 1, 2006, between 8am and 9am, and must arrange for pickup of their quilt on Sunday, June 4, 2006, between 7pm and 8pm. We cannot be responsible for your quilt outside the parameters of the show.

Garment exhibitors must have a dress form for displaying their work. Any member who has a dress form available for use at the show is urged to note this on the registration form. All dress forms and hanging boards must be marked with the owner's name if you wish it to be returned to you at the end of the show. Garments will be handled separately from the dress forms. Any board not labeled will be considered a donation to the guild.

Boutique Information—The Boutique form is available online. Boutique forms can also be obtained from Barb Carney at the April meeting.

Working at the Show – Every year, Quilters' Connection presents one of finest quilt shows in the area, partly due to the fact that our members are enthusiastic about sharing their appreciation and knowledge of quilting so readily with the public.
